

O Government

Beize has been an independent nation since 1961. It is a member of the British Commonwealth of Nations.

O Ambergris Caye

Ambergris Caye is twenty-five miles long; its width ranges from a few hundred feet to over four miles. Northern Ambergris Caye is separated from the southernmost tip of Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula by a small channel. After arriving in Belize City, a short fifteen minute airplane ride gets you to San Pedro, or if you would rather take the scenic route, an hour's boat ride will get you there as well.

O Language

English is the official language and is widely spoken, as is Spanish. Other languages include Creole, Garifuna, Mayan and German.

O Climate

Belize weather is characterized by two seasons: a rainy and a dry season. Most of the year's rainfall occurs during the period of June to November, that is, the rainy season. The average temperature varies from 61°F/27°C along the coast to 68°F/21°C in the hills. The coldest month is January while the highest temperatures are experienced during the month of May.

O Cash & Currency

U.S. dollars are accepted as ourrency countrywide. The common exchange ratio is \$282/\$1 U.S. Licensed moneychangers offer a slightly higher exchange rate, ranging from \$2.058Z to \$2.128Z, depending on the current market.

Nearly all hotels, restaurants and shops accept Visa, Master Card and travelers' checks. Street vendors and smaller establishments in remote areas may accept only cash or travelers' checks.

O Sales Taxes

Belize's sales tax is set at 9% and it is applied to all goods and services, except for telecommunications. There is a 7% hotel tax. Some hotels also add a 10-15% "service charge" to the bill; inquire about this when checking hotel pricess.

O Transportation

The streets are sand, which is great for walking or bike riding. There are few cars; instead, the whickes of choice are electric golf carts, which are available for rent. Please remember that all golf cart drivers MUST have a valid drivers license. Drive with caution, there are many speed bumps around the downtown area that are not marked and always be on the lookout for portholes. Taxi service is available everyplace south of Boca del Rio. Around town the average fee is \$78Z. Some local business, as well as resorts, rent blogoles.

O Telecommunications

All telecommunications services (direct dial phones, fax, telex, cable) are available. There are several "internet Cafe's" on the island where you can access the internet through high-speed internet or satellite connections.

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reparing for a Day Trip

The classic Boy Scout motto "Be Prepared" could not be better words of advice for those planning a day trip. Be it a day of fishing, Manatee watching, or a jungle trip to exotic Mayan Ruins, there are a few items you should not leave your hotel with out, and a few things to remember that will help assure that you have an enjoyable (and safe) experience. Although some of these tips may seem obvious, it is easy to over look them in the excitement of your anticipated adventure.

If you have reserved your trip through your hotel or a tour business you will most likely have a voucher. Many of these businesses list on their vouchers what they recommend you bring. Chances are you will be traveling by boat and there are things you should prepare for. Please don't forget to bring your voucher when you board the boat. Many times folks have to sit and wait in the boat while some-



one boarding has to run back to their room to retrieve their forgotten voucher. Most excursions pick up people at the docks along the front beach and people who hold things up ultimately make the trip late. That said, if you are waiting to be picked up at 7:00 a.m. don't panic at 7:30 that you missed the boat. Chances are your charter was held up for a dozen different reasons. When a boat does arrive, be sure to find out where it is going, as there are several different tour companies and tours offered on the is-



long hair, plan on tying it back, braiding it is even better. Hats are always a good idea, but if you cannot secure it on your head, you should be prepared to fish it out of the ocean the first good breeze that comes along. Don't forget the sunscreen, and if you are swimming during the trip you should reapply often. Even on a cloudy day the sun can filter through, and with the reflection on the water you can get a lot of sun without realizing it. If you are wearing shorts don't forget to apply sunscreen to the tops of your legs and feet, you will be in a sitting position on the boat and these sensitive "haven't seen the light of day" areas tend to burn fast. Most boats do not have rest rooms, so be sure to take care of business before boarding, or you may find yourself in an embarrassing "over-the-boat" moment. Remember, many of the rides into the main land take well over an hour and can be on choppy waters. Early morning trips can be a bit chilly, and a light, long-sleeved shirt can provide warmth, as well as sun protection. Depending on the weather there can be a good amount of ocean spray, so it is possible that what ever you wear and bring along might get wet. A zip lock bags works great to protect your valuable camera and other items. Of course a beach towel is a must as well. Don't worry about getting a little wet, just sit back and enjoy the refreshing sea spray while taking in the transparent azure waters.

If you are on a snorkeling trip you should be sure that a) you have your equipment, b) you rented equipment or c) the tour is providing you with equipment. If

you are a first time snorkeler remember that the guides are there to help you, they are pro's at this. If you are fishing, find out in advance what, if anything, you are expected to bring. Again, most fishing boats provide the poles and bair

Many of the day trips offer jungle excursions to near-by Mayan Ruins or to the Caves Branch River for some incredible cave tubing. On any trip that involves walking the rule of thumb is "sensible shoes". You will be walking on jungle pathways that can be slippery when wet and on surfaces that are uneven. A pair of tennis shoes or a fitted Teva-like sandal is your best bet, slipon sandals and any kind of heel is a just a bad idea.

The larger tour companies, like SEArious Adventures and SEAduced, stock their boats with coolers full of soda pop, water, Belikin beer and if you are lucky, rum punch. Most guides are attentive and generous, if they have something you need or forgot they will gladly share or accommodate you as best as possible.

Last, but not least, always day-trip with a small amount of cash. Even if the land part of your trip includes meals, you may decide you want an additional beverage at the local restaurant or come across a trinket you can't live without. If you don't spend the cash on your trip, and you enjoyed your journey, your guide will certainly appreciate a tip. Remember that this is his job, and that he might do the same trip day after day during the peak tourist season. Was he enthusiastic, friendly and helpful? If so let him know you appreciate they way he shared his incredible world with you.

By the end of the day you will be tired and elated by the unique experiences of the day behind you. Although you may be eager to pack in as many things in a day as possible while on your vacation, chances are that when you do return to your room you will be ready for a shower, a low-keyed dinner and bed. Planning a big dinner (with reservations that you may be late for) and a night on the town may not sound all that exciting by end of your day.

Chances are you will cherish the memory of your day for many years to come, and the more prepared you are the more you will enjoy your Belizean adventure.

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A MAN AND HIS ART

If you haven't visited the Stoned Art Studio then you have missed a unique visual experience. In a time when many of us would like what we say to be written in stone, the fact remains that there is only one person who is gifted enough to do so by casting his art in a self formulated reconstituted limestone. Known to those who purchase his unique and outstanding pieces as "Jaime", his artist signature, but to those who know him on Ambergris Caye, Jim Diehl is the man and the originator behind Stoned Art. An artist for over forty years, selling his first oil painting at the age of sixteen, Jim has worked in various medias including pen and ink, acrylics and he has sculpted in wood, stone and clay, designed jewelry and interior design. Jim prides himself that he has always worked freelance never depending on a nine to five job. But it doesn't stop there. Since Jim's

arrival here over ten years ago, escaping the treacherous cold and snow of his native Ohio, he has been involved in Belizean life unlike many of us who migrate from the far frozen north just to soak up the sun and the rum. Jim has been a "Special Constable" in the Belize Police Force under the program Citizens Crime Committee, in conjunction with the San Pedro Chamber of Commerce working over 1300 hours in a period of 18 months. He also serves a volunteer on the San Pedro Fire epartment, being the second man on the hose and has helped fight eight fires. His never-ending energy has placed him on the San Pedro Emergency Committee, which is a part of NEMO. Starting with hurricane Mitch, which completely destroyed his first studio located at the Boat Yard, at a loss of over 160,000 BZ dollars, Jim continues to be an active volunteer in the San Pedro Community. How many of us can attribute to all of that? But despite his relentless energy and his committed dedication to help, Jim stills finds time to do the thing he loves most, his sculptured art. Unfortunately, volunteer work doesn't pay the bills, so after hurricane Keith. Jim had to rebuild his studio which is now located behind the Fairdale Plaza, basically starting all over. But Jim is not one to complain, he just sees what the problem is and gets down to the nitty gritty and gets the job done.

Sculpture is one of the greatest art forms, one which has been practiced from the beginning of time and which fills a significant human need today. Throughout the ages, man has found sculpture a vital way of expressing his thoughts and feelings for himself and for others and also of enriching his environment. Contemporary sculpture, marked by great diversity, shows a tremendous development of abstract and non-objective work, which greatly broadens the scope of the sculptor. It seems likely this artistic process will continue in its diversification and experimentation, for

tendencies are in full flood. But whatever the particular forms that sculpture will take, it will continue to express the hopes, fears and ideals of man. It will continue to be a record of the human spirit.

The art scene in Belize, although diverse, is dominated by paintings of tropical motifs of village life, the sea, things that we commonly notice, woodcarvings of dolphins, bowls of all sorts and sizes. Stoned Art stands out like a Mayan ruin. In fact, some of Jim's motifs are Mayan but "Since we live on the second largest Barrier Reef in the Western hemisphere, underwater scenes are more apropos" says, Jim. Many of the visitors to Ambergris Cave seem to enjoy his craft, and in fact many of the tourist who return year after year continue to purchase his work, spreading Jim's creations through

out the world. Although Stone Art may add a few extra pounds to your luggage, the investment is well worth the effort. When tourist travel they like to buy things that are unusual, unique and have that quality that causes people when they get back home to ask that enviable question, "Where did you get that?"

In economic times as these, people on vacation are seeking real values and at the same time quality items, *Stone Art* offers that and a great deal more, it gives you the feeling of Belize, with all her wonders, with all her beauty, so if you're living or visiting San Pedro be sure to drop by the "Stoned Art Studio" and see the man and his art. Jim is also available for contract work and can design specific pieces. The studio is located at 32 Sea Star Street in San Pedro.

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Reef Brief


Ecosystems are made up of living things working to trap and process energy generated by the sun, passing it through the system by means of feeding relationships between producers, consumers, and decomposers. Producers are plantsthe only living things are capable of collecting and converting solar energy into a form that can be used by most animals. Consumers are animals that either directly obtain energy from plants (primary consumers) or consume other animals. Animals that consume other animals are consumers of different levels (secondary or higher-level consumers) depending on their distance from the producer on the food chain. Decomposers are species that recycle nutrients from non-living plant and animal material.

Primary production is the amount of carbon fixed by the producers through the making of organic matter from inorganic compounds (carbon dioxide, water) using energy taken from solar radiation. This process is called photosynthesis. This production is essential to the marine populations of animals, protozoans, and bacteria that cannot make their own food. The primary productivity of the world's oceans is estimated at nearly 28 billion tons of carbon or 250-300 billion tons of photosynthetically produced material generated each year. Different areas of the oceans produce different amounts of carbon and the production rate is dependent on the availability of solar radiation, nutrients, and grazing

Approximately 10% of plant energy consumed by an animal will actually

become available for use by that animal. 10% of that animal's energy will become available to the animal from the next level up. This 10% energy transfer continues as you move up the food chain. For example, it takes 1,000 kilograms of plants to support a 100-kilogram plant feeder, 1 kilogram of a secondary consumer, and only 0.1 kilo-



gram of a higher-level consumer. So, as one moves through the food chain, one finds out that it take a huge amount of plants to support an apex predator, such as a Bull Shark.

Rinse the chicken wings under cold running water, then drain and blot dry. Place the wings in a large bowl and sprinkle with the garlic salt, pepper, cayenne, and oregano. Season just 1 side of the wings for mild, or for hotter wings, turn the wings to coat the other side with seasonings and then cover and marinate in the refrigerator for 24 hours.

Preheat a grill to medium-high Grill chicken wings, turning once, until the juices run clear when pierced with a fork. Serve immediately with a side of Blue Cheese Dressing.

The Smooth-billed Ani (crotophaga ani) is classified in the order of Cuculiform from a family called cuculidae.

The Ani is a black tropical American Cuckoo. This family is an old group of birds; fossils date to the Oligocene epoch (24 million years ago) and possibly earlier. Ambergris' Smooth-billed Anis are becoming increasingly rare. The Ani appears to be a common black bird at first glance but a bird of distinction upon second look. The facial skin is bare, black and full of personality. Its bill is very large and seems over sized, also black and laterally flattened. They have zygodactyl feet like the woodpecker, which uses them to stand on a vertical surface. However, the Ani does not seem to use them for this purpose, and is forced to hop instead of walk when on the ground. The Ani uses its feet to move quickly and expertly through the brush, walking limberly and agile from limb to

Words used to describe the Ani by ornithologist surprise me. "Disheveled, with wings drooping," said David Allen Sibley. "Flight appears inept, often crash lands into bushes," said Steve Howell in his Guide to Birds of Northern Central America. "An ungainly-looking black bird," said Gary Stiles in his Guide To The Birds Of Costa Rica. "In flight, Anis flap their wings loosely, the long tail, which appears as if on a hinge, swings up and down and from side to side like a pendulum, and looks as though it might drop off." That's a direct quote from the Audubon Society Field Guide. It's odd how the comments of others form opinions in us. The Anis are unique, highly evolved, intelligent, very well adapted birds that are suffering habitat loss from human mismanagement of the environment.

I've never seen a smooth-billed Anis on the island except in association with the phenomena of swarming Black Army Ants. The ants at certain times appear like a carpet of black on the littoral forest, floor covering every square inch of an area as they travel along. It's at these times that the Ani seems to enjoy eating its fill, in fact it's like an ant fest. The birds seem to roll around in the ants, I truly could not tell if it was wallowing in pleasure or wiping the crawling ants off parts they were not wanted. A very strange site that repeated itself each time I was privileged to observe the ants. Bubba said he has a suspicion that the Smooth-Billed Anis know when the Black Army Ant is going to swarm and visits the island for this occasion.

Along with the Smooth-billed Ani, there are two other known species of the crotophaga family, the Grove-billed Ani and the Greater Ani. The Groove-billed lives throughout Belize's lowlands in communal groups of up to twenty birds that defend a territory. When courting, the male attracts the female with cooing calls and then offers her food. Mating occurs when a female accepts the males offering; food is often exchanged during copulation. As a group, the Anis builds a large stick platform in which the group's females each lay up to seven eggs. Their nests are built of twigs and leaves. Both sexes install more leaves on a daily basis. These leaves are used to separate layers of eggs, about seven to eight eggs per layer. One bird of either sex incubates at a time. The young

asynchronously (over a staggered duration of time) hatch and all members of the group feed them. When the number of hatched chicks require more food than the adults can supply, the parents

stop incubating the eggs. This causes the fertilized, unhatched young to die in the egg. If a nest is robbed, it is covered with leaves and a new one is started immedi-

America in the past. Not much is known about them. The American Ornithologist Union included this species as a resident as late as 1983, but its existence has not been confirmed as of late, and it is now believed that it has been extirpated by habitat loss. The word extirpated was used by more than one book that Bubba read on the Greater Ani. It is a word you might use to describe what is done to weeds in the garden.

Ambergris Caye is a salty, sandy, littoral habitat with many lagoons that give rise to a multitude of fish. This accommodates only a specific group of birds that chose to reside here. The Anis does not seem to fit into that group. On Ambergris, I see from time to time, birds like the Scissor-tail Flycatcher, Yellow Breasted Trogon or Agami Heron that are fresh water creatures of the jungle. Their visits have to do with weather events that give opportunity for foods they do not commonly find here. I think Bubba's theory of the Anis visiting the island only at times when the ants swarm and not residing here is probably correct. There is a great deal not known about this unique bird that may never be know before they also are extirpated. 24 million years is time enough to develop a chest full of valuable knowledge. If you have been paying close attention to the birds you have also seen parallels with human behavior and see in nature information about our own issues, some valuable, some trivial and some humorous. The information Bubba collected about the Anis provided me with some insight into male and female traditional roles, communal living and even information about birth control. After 24 million years of successfully adapting to everything nature threw at them, shouldn't we try and keep them around to learn all we



Foods That Heal: Tomatoes

Instead of writing about diseases that most of us can't pronounce and probably won't ever catch. I decided to write about the foods that can help protect us from these nasty ailments. These are foods that we are most familiar with, foods that we eat everyday or at least should eat. The first in a series of "Foods that Heal" articles let us start with the history and benefits of the well know tomato.

Tomatoes are native to tropical America, having been found by the early explorers in both Mexico and Peru, where they were cultivated and eaten by the Aztecs and Incas as early as 700 A.D. The name comes from the Indian name, tomatl. Europeans first saw the tomato when the Conquistadors reached Mexico and Central America in the 16th century. Tomato seeds were taken back to Europe where they quickly found favor in the Mediterranean countries of Spain, Portugal and Italy. Contrary to stories about them, tomatoes were grown for food in Europe as early as the sixteenth century, though they were not popular in some countries. They were introduced to the oriental countries in the eighteenth century and Thomas Jefferson grew them in his garden in1781. The first varieties cultivated were ribbed, some of them red, others yellow. Smooth round tomatoes were developed in the nineteenth century. Cherry tomatoes (bite size) were grown in the sixteenth century; pear-shaped tomatoes, also know as plum or Italian, were a nineteenth century

The tomato is perennial (lasting for several years) and is a member of the "deadly nightshade" family. It is first cousins in the upper hierarchy of potatoes and tobacco and the family also includes egglalnt (aubergine), green and red peppers (sweet peppers) in the vegetable garden, and the petunia, browallia and salpiglossis in the flower garden.

Although a perennial in the tropics, tomatoes are grown as annuals (living

only for one season) in the temperate zones and varieties have been developed which will bear fruit as little as 65 days after planting. They still have a preference for hot weather, though, and do their best growing in temperatures ranging from 70 to 90 degrees.

development.

Researchers have surveyed the eating habits of over 47,000 men between the ages of 40-75 for six years and found that the consumption of tomatoes, tomato sauce, tomato juice and pizza was associated with a reduced risk for de-

veloping prostate cancer. Researchers theorize that lycopene, an antioxidant nutrient found in large amounts in tomatoes, may be responsible for this possible protective effect. The red pigment contained in tomatoes is called lycopene. This compound appears to act as an antioxidant, neutralizing free radicals that can damage cells in the body. Only recently, studies have revealed that

lycopene may have twice the punch of another well-known antioxidant betacarotene. Studies conducted by Harvard researchers have discovered that men who consumed 10 servings of tomatoes a week, or

the equivalent to 10 slices of pizza, can cut the risk of developing prostate cancer by a formidable 45 percent. However,

> its benefits are not limited to the prostate. Italian researchers have found that those who consume more than 7 servings of raw tomatoes lower the risk of developing rectal, colon or stomach cancers by 60 percent. Israeli researchers have found that lycopene is a powerful inhibitor of lung, breast, and endometrial (mucous membrane lining of the uterus) cancer cells. Research has also indicated that the lycopene in tomatoes can help older people stay active longer.

New research is beginning to indicate that tomatoes may be used to help prevent lung cancer. Two powerful compounds found in tomatoes, coumaric acid and chlorogenic acid, are thought to block the effects of nitrosamines. These are compounds that not only are formed naturally in the body, but also are the strongest carcinogen in tobacco smoke. By blocking the effects of these nitrosamines, the chances of lung cancer are reduced significantly.

When choosing your tomatoes, be sure to pick those with the most

brilliant shades of red. These indicate the highest amounts of betacarotene and lycopene. Though raw tomatoes are great for you, cooking them releases even more of the benefits. Lycopene is located in the cell wall of the tomato, so by cooking it in a bit of oil, this healing compound is more fully released. In addition, cooking the tomato in olive oil allows your body to absorb the lycopene better. Don't worry about the availability of fresh tomatoes. Tomatoes don't lose any of their nutritional value in the

high heat processing used in making canned tomatoes and tomato sauce, both are just as viable and beneficial as fresh tomatoes.

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
