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

The second man to walk on the moon was recently visiting Belize to explore the underwater paradise of the world's second largest barrier reef. Buzz Aldrin was at Journey's End last weekend along with other members of an elite society that make up the SeaSpace Symposium. Aldrin is a charter member of the 35-year-old organization. He told *The San Pedro Sun* there are many similarities between the ocean and space. "I was the first astronaut to practice space walking with the use of neutral buoyancy in the water," he explained.

Aldrin said that in addition to diving, the SeaSpace Symposium discusses current and future events impacting space and the oceans. He said he looks forward to the Shuttle missions resuming and admires President Bush's commitment to again explore beyond Earth's orbit with missions back to the moon and to Mars. The group also discussed exploring the ocean depths including a search for the plane that crashed with the famed pilot Amelia Earhart near the Howland Island in the Pacific Ocean.

Aldrin has traveled to the far side of the moon, and has explored the ocean depths including taking a submersible to visit the Titanic. He raved about his visit to Belize. "I think the country has a great future. You have a lot of resources and obviously a lot of people are coming to vacation and even to buy homes."

Aldrin added that the diving was excellent and the hospitality was superb. "I hope to come back soon."

"Go Dive" makes diving fun and easy

San Pedro is a diving community and "if you don't dive" as I've heard it said many times, "It's like going to Aspen and not skiing."

If you are visiting San Pedro and would love to try the thrill of being underwater, you might consider diving in a one day Scuba Diving experience. Although to get fully Scuba certified takes approximately four days, you can meet with your instructor at 8:00 a.m. and finish your first dive before lunch.

Once you have discovered Scuba and it is something you would love to pursue, this one-day experience is also taking a big step towards getting certified. San Pedro has a long list of dive operations and many good diving instructors that can introduce you to scuba diving. Your hotel will offer you an opportunity to connect with one and all you need to do is say that you want to try a "Discover Scuba Diving" course. The prices for this unique and amazing experience ranges from \$150 US to \$200 US and will include everything you need.

At the dive shop, you will be shown a short video of what to expect. Your instructor will help you select and try on your gear. Remember: you can always use the same mask and fins you use while snorkeling. Try on different masks until you find one that fits comfortably and probably won't leak – Tight is bad.

Your tank of air and regulator will also be provided. The regulator forms a part of a flotation jacket called a BCD (Buoyancy Control Device) – a fancy jacket that holds the tank and fills with air when a button is pushed in order to float you.



The first dive is in a pool, shallow enough to stand in. Your instructor guides you step by step while you take your first breath underwater. Emphasis is placed on the golden rule of diving, "Never hold your breath." You and your instructor will go under water and take the regulator out of your mouths and make bubbles together. Instructors call this the "fried egg test," because when they do this with first time dive students, sometimes behind the faceplate of the mask, the student's eyes look like two fried eggs.

Expect to learn a little sign language so you can communicate underwater. Divers use the OK sign for answering a question often. It is not hard to pick up the underwater lingo and be making up your own in minutes.

After learning to find your regulator if it falls out of your mouth while you are laughing, getting water out of your mask, and practicing breathing from your

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Conch Pearls Treasures from the Caribbean

Conch pearls are not an often topic of discussion, and in fact, many do not even know what a conch pearl is. Nowadays, conch pearls are being prized for their beauty and rarity. These precious pearls are very rare gems and are produced by Queen Conch mollusks. Researchers say that it takes about ten thousand Queen Conchs to find one Conch pearl and one in a hundred is of gem quality. These precious gems are found mostly in the Florida cayes and in the Caribbean. These areas are known as the "Conch Republic" because they cannot be found anywhere else on Earth.

Conch Pearls come in an array of dazzling colors, usually matching the inside surface of the shell. Actually, Conch pearls are not considered true pearls, because they do not contain nacre, which is the basic substance that is secreted by the mollusks. Today, no one has yet to devise a method for culturing them, so every one you see will be a natural pearl; therefore, they are considered extremely rare and valuable. Speaking of valuable, these pearls are targeted not only for its beauty and rarity, but also for the weight. The average size of the conch pearl ranges from one to three millimeters and is heavier than any other pearl. It is above all enchanting because of its fascinating play of colors, from white to delicate pink to luminous pink, or from cream to olive to chocolate brown. The noblest pearls show on their surface a wavy structure like the finest silk or in some cases they are strongly grained. Unlike other pearls, the conch is evaluated in carats. The normal sizes are between two and six carat; pearls of eight to twelve carat considered a rarity and 20 carat pearls are a unique collectors' item.

In addition to its often-striking colors, the conch pearl often has another important surface feature called a "flame structure," which is a unique pattern in the coloration. The flame structure generally appears in the pink or white pearls, although other colors are sometimes exhibited. An important fact to remember when purchasing a Conch pearl is that its colors tend to fade significantly over time. Experts are not completely sure why, although sunlight is often cited as at least one factor in the fading. Some say that it is best to wear these precious pearls in the evening and not let it be exposed to sunlight because of the fading factor.

Despite, the uniqueness and exclusivity of the pearl, there is an increasing problem for the Conch pearl due to a major, worldwide issue. Environmental pollution is greatly endangering the pearl producing Conch. Drastic reductions in the number of these organisms have already been witnessed in many parts of the Caribbean and likely soon around more areas as well. This means that the Conch pearl will remain ex-


tremely precious, and increase in its rarity and exclusivity.




Conch pearls occur in a variety of shapes and bright colors. You can see the unique "flame structure" in some of the pearls' colorations.

Skunk Root or Snowberry

Zorillo (Spanish) Pay-che (Maya)

Scientific Name: Chiococca alba **Plant Family:** Rubiaceae

Description: A vining shrub up to three meters tall; the stem is somewhat square in shape and when cut or peeled, has a strong odor reminiscent of a skunk; its flowers and fruits are white; with its fruits about four to eight millimeters long; the seeds are dark brown and three to four millimeters long.

Habitat: Forests, especially on hillsides.

Traditional Uses: The action of zorillo on the body is very strong - care must be taken when using this remedy as it often proves to be too potent for the elderly and the very weak. For delayed menstruation, ulcers of the stomach or intestines, constipation, obstructed bowels, colitis, endometriosis, pain, nervousness, dementia and depression, kidney troubles, flatulence, aphrodisiac, venereal disease, skin sores, cough, bronchitis, laryngitis, asthma, snakebite, rheumatism, purgative, swollen legs/feet, dementia, depression, witchcraft, "mal de ojo" boil a small handful of chopped root in three cups of water for 10 minutes; strain and drink one cup before each meal. Children should take one cup daily in sips throughout the day for any of the above ailments.

Prepare as above and use as an excellent skin wash for stubborn sores, rashes and ulcers. For alcoholism, place one handful of chopped root in about one quart of rum, vodka or gin. Soak in sun for five days and strain. Persons wishing to kick the habit must take one shot daily of this mixture or be allowed to finish the entire quart at once. They will vomit violently, after which it is said that the smell of alcohol will make them nauseous for years to come.

Used to dispel witchcraft and evil eye, and drunk by shamans to strengthen *spiritual powers*. Said to be the "thinking herb" of the Maya – able to give relief in a great variety of complaints and used when all else fails or the practitioner is unsure of the ailment.

Research Results: An ethanol extract of the dried leaf of zorillo showed *in vitro* cytotoxic activity (KB cancer cell line – 65% inhibition of cell growth) as did similar extracts of the stem (77.5% inhibition of cell growth) and root (96.6% inhibition of cell growth) (Nascimiento et al. 1990). Compounds identified in zorillo include coumarins, alkanes, carbohydrates and lignans (El-Hafiz et al. 1991).


National Park and Marine Reserve was there with a shell and pottery guessing game and educational posters about the Reserve.

buddy's extra regulator, you'll be going on a dive. When you get on a dive boat with all the certified divers, you are going to want to look as much like a pro as possible, so here is a short list of do's and don'ts.

Do make sure you're budded up with another diver preferably your instructor. Good buddies are always there ready to help out if necessary.

Don't ride to the dive site with your fins and mask on, that's about a 10 on the dive nerd scale. There is plenty of time to on your gear after you arrive at the dive site.

Don't wear your mask on your forehead while on the surface of the water. This means distress to the rescue divers and they will tow you back to the boat.

Do be very careful not to touch the corals, they are delicate and grow extremely slow.

Do listen to the dive briefing. A dive master will tell you how to get in and out of the boat, how deep the dive will be, how long you'll be underwater, and what you are likely to see.

Diving is a trip into another world where we are the visiting aliens. In San Pedro, on a forty-minute dive, you are likely to see green moray eels, nurse sharks, southern stingrays, spotted eagle rays, barracuda and several types of fishes, coral, sea grass – the sights are endless.

Usually the boar ride back from the site is chilly, you are wet and the wind makes a light, dry sweatshirt feel good. Back at the dive shop, divers rinse off and sign each other's log book. Divers keep records of where they were, the depths and times and what they saw.

The Instructor's signature in your logbook will credit you for the first of four dives needed for your full open water certification. Rules are, after you have had the "Discover Scuba Diving" experience with your instructor and want to dive again (and you will) you should be buddies with a dive master and not deeper that 40 feet.

The "Go Dive" book, the instruction manual used, says, "Learning to dive empowers people to meet goals and may lead to high levels of excitement and adventures not intended for those who still rely on their floaties or for channel surfing couch potatoes."

The Boat-billed Heron

"Tito," one of my favorite bird watching tour guides, recently discovered Boat-billed Herons amongst the mangrove in the back of Ambergris. I had only seen Boat-bills in estuary habitat (the wide low course of a river into which the tides flow) and was excited because its daytime sighting could mean a colony on Ambergris.

Bubba said that the single species of Boat-bill Heron is divided into five races and there are questions concerning whether to include it in the family Ardeidae (herons and bitterns) or to give it its own family. Its largest differences are in its specialized feeding niche and corresponding adaptations (its bill). His excitement is the Boat-bill remains a poorly known bird and somewhat mysterious. The label given to this rare bird's existence in the world is retiring.

Boat-billed Heron inhabit all of Belize but are more strictly nocturnal than the Night Heron, unlikely to be seen in daylight away from roosts or colonies.

A non-migratory bird, Boat-bills inhabit both fresh and salt water areas throughout Belize. They are found often in thickly vegetated rivers but are also known to hunt along beaches.

Boat-billed Herons seem to be strongly nocturnal in their hunting behavior. By day they preen and roost quietly in dense mangrove thickets near feeding areas, venturing forth at dusk to forage. Although Boat-bills can hunt in the wade-and-stab manner of other herons, there is reason to believe that they switch to touch-feeding like the spoonbills during the breeding season when they consume shrimp and other mud dwelling prey that cannot be located except by dwelling.

Bubba said, "Birds often communicate with social signals. The Boatbilled Heron have developed most signals different from other heron; only two of the twelve most common displays in the Boat-bills repertoire are like that of the heron. Instead of the visual signals, characteristic of most heron communication, the Boat-billed heron relies more on acoustic signals, both vocal and mechanical, that penetrate the mangrove tangle more efficiently. The large bill also serves as a resonator, producing single and mul-



tiple bill-pops that resemble loud human handclaps."

The postures and movements used in the displays are generally simple and slow. Many are enhanced by the erecting of the broad crown plumes which produces a highly conspicuous black array above the white forehead. Between members of a mated pair there is a great deal of ritualized mutual preening behavior (called bill-clappering) that probably serves to strengthen the pair bond.

It is not known whether the Boat-billed herons form new pair bonds each year or retain the previous year's mate. Both sexes share in nest building, incubating, and feeding the chicks. Three or four pale greenish-blue eggs sometimes bearing small red flecks are laid at roughly two-day intervals. Incubation commences with the first egg, producing an asynchronous hatch. Later, if the chick's total energy demands the parents' ability to provide food, only the youngest chick starves. As in other herons, chicks are fed by regurgitation by the parents. Wouldn't it be wonderful to have a colony on Ambergris to watch all this at close quarters? If it's found and we respect it with quiet undisturbing visits it will be a unique attraction for our bird watching tourist visitors.



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Our National Flag:Rich in History



The red, white and blue flag of Belize symbolizes the unity of its people. Prior to Independence, the People's United Party (PUP) proposed a blue flag with the Coat of Arms in a white circle. This was practically an exact copy of the PUP party flag and aroused much public opposition. The United Democratic Party UDP (party flag features red as a prominent color) proposed that red stripes be added to the upper and lower portions of the flag, as this would rally all citizens, regardless of their political affiliation. As a consequence, the bi-partisan National

Symbols Committee invited citizens to submit designs for a National Flag. The design selected by the Committee is a royal blue flag with one horizontal red stripe at the top, one at the bottom, and a white circle with the Coat of Arms in the center.

The white disk in the center has 50 olive leaves along its inner border. This represents the year 1950, when British Honduras (Belize's former name) began its quest for independence from the United Kingdom.


The Coat of Arms features a mahogany tree: the first European settlers in Belize became mahogany traders and the mahogany trade was once the economical backbone of the colony in the 18th and 19th centuries. The shield of the Coat of Arms is divided into three sections by a vertical line and an inverted V. The base section represents a ship in full sail on waves of the sea, since most of the Mahogany inn the

country was shipped to Great Britain where it was in much demand for creating fine furniture. The two upper sections show tools of the timber industry in Belize: a paddle and a squaring axe in the right section and a saw and a beating axe in the left section.

Supporting the shield are two woodcutters, the one on the right holding a beating axe over his shoulder in his right hand, and the one on the left holding a paddle over his shoulder in his left hand, since rivers were the mode of transportation for getting cut logwood back to the settlement; the logwood cutters found themselves paddling further up stream to find fresh logwood areas.

Lastly, there is a flowing scroll underneath the Coat of Arms bearing the Latin motto "sub umbra floreo," meaning "under the shade I flourish," or/ and implying "under the shade of the mahogany tree we flourish."
