Customized Belizean Jewelry

A lot of people come to our island to experience a unique culture and enjoy one-of-a-kind adventures. Upon departure, tourists like to take some mementos for friends or for themselves to remind them of their great trip to La Isla Bonita. As is often the case, great local jewelry tops the list. Who wouldn't want some truly unique bracelet or earrings made of shells and natural stones, customized to fit perfectly and to suit one's taste and budget.

Well in San Pedro, there is such a person who can meet these needs, and always with a smile and a story.

You can usually catch him at work near the church. Israel and his wife, Natalia, have a table set up next to Mambo Chill where they display their artwork. This usually includes a wide array of bracelets, earrings and necklaces. There are the requisite hematite, quartz and jade items as well, but Mr. Zetina is known for hand-crafting personalized items of shell and coral (brown and black).

Mr. Zetina started his career in handcrafting after he moved from Branch Mouth in Cayo District in 1986. He moved to San Pedro and began working for his brother Ricardo Zetina at the Little Old Craft Shop. He remained there for ten years, learning and perfecting his craft until he decided to set up his own place, now known as *The Creative Handmade Craft Spot*.

Israel spent a full year struggling to survive on his own, having invested most of his capital to become independent. In that year, Israel managed to establish a rapport with his clients, and he has become known for custom crafting items for individuals.

He makes special orders for pretty much anyone who appreciates well-made, custom jewelry. His favorite materials to work with are the shell and coral. He uses up to six different types of shells, including the Whelk, Pink Conch, Triton, Trumpet, Helmet and King Conch Shell. The great thing about using these materials is that they're natural and can be easily found in San Pedro. On the deeper shelves of the largest barrier reef in the Western Hemisphere, at depths of 30 to 50 feet or more, fishermen collect these shells and bring them to land. Mr. Zetina says that his most popular items are those made of the whelk shell and coral.

Other materials that he uses to create his pieces are bought in Belize City or elsewhere in the mainland. Clients can also find items made with limestone and slate, amongst other pretty beads.






Tropical sea kayaking in the Belizean Cayes means crystal clear waters, thousands of coral reefs, extremely abundant and varied marine life, while enjoying the steamy rays of the sun. The water temperatures in Belize range from 78 degrees to 80 degrees Fahrenheit during the months of December and January, while February through August temperatures can warm to 90 degrees to 92 degrees Fahrenheit. These temperatures makes sea Kayaking in San Pedro such a unique and gorgeous experience, as paddlers get a first look at the blue waters teeming with brilliantly colored fish, sea grass beds, and colorful corals.





The Amazing Neotropical Migratory Bird

A Neotropical migratory bird is a bird that breeds in Canada and the United States during the summer months and spends the winter months in Mexico, Central America, South America or the Caribbean islands. According to a more strict definition used by some scientists, Neotropical migratory birds are Western Hemisphere species in which the majority of individuals breeds north of the Tropic of Cancer and winters south of that same latitude. (The Tropic of Cancer is a line of latitude 23 degrees north of the equator which marks the northern extent of the tropics.) Based on this definition, there are about 200 species of Neo-



tropical migratory birds. The majority are songbirds (such as warblers, thrushes, tanagers, and vireos), but there are also many shorebirds (such as sandpipers, plovers, and terns), some raptors (such as hawks, kites and vultures), and a few types of waterfowl (such as teal).

Migration distances vary greatly between species and between individual birds of the same species. The shortest migrations are made by birds that breed in the southern United States and winter in Mexico or the West Indies, a trip which can be as short as a few hundred miles. Examples of birds that make such relatively short migrations include all Black-capped Vireos and Lucy's Warblers, and some Painted Buntings, Northern Parulas, and Gray Catbirds.

Some of the longest migrations are made by shorebirds that nest in the arctic tundra of northernmost Canada and winter as far south as Tierra del Fuego (the southernmost part of South America), a one-way distance of up to 10,000 miles (16,000 kilometers). Red Knots and White-rumped Sandpipers are two species that make this remarkable journey.

Other birds that winter in South America, and thus travel great distances, include: Common Nighthawks, Swainson's Hawks, Red-eyed Vireos, Purple Martins, Barn and Cliff Swallows, Blackpoll, Cerulean and Connecticut Warblers, Scarlet Tanagers, and Bobolinks. A round-trip migration distance for

many of these species is as much as 13,600 miles (22,000 kilometers).

The best explanation for why birds fly such great distances is it allows them to take advantage of seasonally abundant food and to avoid times when or places where food and other resources are scarce. You may have guessed that they migrate south to avoid the cold of our winter, but there are many species of birds which can and do tolerate cold temperatures, as long as food is plentiful. The types of food that Neotropical migratory birds need, such as flying insects, caterpillars, fruits and nectar, are super-abundant during the spring and summer in the United States, but are not sufficiently available through the winter.

Ultimately, the reason why migration persists is because it increases "breeding success", that is birds are able to raise more young on average by migrating than they would if they remained in the tropics. The abundant, protein-rich food, longer daylight hours, greater area over which the birds can spread, and, possibly, fewer predators account for the potential to raise more young.

A one-way migration can take anywhere from several weeks to 4 months. The pace of migration tends to be faster in the spring, with the pace picking up as a bird gets closer to its breeding area. For most birds, the pace in the fall tends to be more leisurely and more evenly paced. Typically, migration is ac-

Reef Brief

Why do fish "go to school?"

You've probably heard of schools of fish. If you've been snorkeling on the reef, then you've seen them too. We all know that fish don't join these schools to take classes like people do, but why do fish gather in these large groups? It turns out they have a lot of good reasons to do it, from helping them find food to helping them not be food for another fish. A school of fish is a cluster of fishes migrating or feeding together. Schools are classified as being polarized or nonpolarized. In polarized groups, all the members face the same direction, while the fish move in many different directions in non-polarized groups.

Many people think fish school in order to avoid predation. By forming a cluster, the predator will believe the school is a much larger animal and it will be harder to pick out individuals. As a group, it will also be easier for the school to spot the predator early. In addition, 'selfish herd' behavior is common to groups of animals because they form herds to increase their chances of survival by having more numbers. The predator has a wider number to choose from, giving each fish hope that the predator will choose some other member of the group, thus giving the rest a chance to escape. So, the fish's "selfish" reason to be part of a school is that if they join the group, a predator will eat another fish instead of them. This is possibly the rationale for schooling in small plankton-feeding fishes such as Sliversides and Redear Herring.

Schooling may also help with migration, because the fishes at the head of the

following. Teamwork may also decrease time for migration and effort spent, which can lead to the taking of larger food items as well. This may apply to school Tunas, a fast-moving fish species that lives in deep, open waters.

Algae grazers that move around the reef a lot, such as Surgeonfish, may also benefit from schooling by being more competitive for food with Damselfishes who aggressively defend the algae patches they tend. A single Blue Tang or Parrotfish may be chased away by attacks from the Damselfish. However, in a school, there are too many members for the Damselfish to fight off.

Ant Bush or Coffee Senna (English)

Frijolillo (Spanish)

Scientific Name: Senna occidentalis (L.) Link

Plant Family: Caesalpiniaceae

Description: A weedy annual herb to one millimeter tall with stout branches; leaves with four to six pairs of leaflets, each 3-7 centimeters long; flowers in yellow racemes arising from the leaf axils; fruit a pod, 6-12 centimeters long by 6-9 millimeters wide.

Habitat: Clearings, edge of forests, roadside, pastures, yards and empty lots.

Traditional Uses: Useful as a tonic herb for

many ailments — make tea from entire plant boiled for ten minutes in three cups water and drink two cups daily. One root is boiled with two cups of water for ten minutes and consume warm twice daily for *fever* and *flu*. Leaves are toasted, ground and mixes with egg white and brandy to be applied as a poultice to pulse at wrist of child or adult to counteract *weakness* and *exhaustion* (especially due to old age or illness).

Midwives do a *pregnancy test* by having women urinate on yama bush leaves; if leaves look scorched, baby is due.

For *menstrual pain*, boil roots of one plant in three cups of water for ten minutes; drink three cups hot before meals.

For weakness of heart, mash leaves with egg and rum; wrap this in cotton cloth and lay over heart against skin once daily for one hour. To rid a rude, crabby child of its bad temper, spank the child with branches of this plant; then throw the branches away. The roasted, ground seeds make a fine coffee substitute.

Research Results: There has been a great deal of chemical and pharmacological work with this plant. *In vitro* anti-fungal activity



against Epidermophyton floccosum, Micorsporum gypseum, Trichophyton mentagrophytes, and Trichophyton rubrum has been shown in broth culture from a one milliliter concentration hot water extract of dried root, leaf and seed (Caceres et al. 1991). Undiluted essential leaf oil has shown in vitro activity against Fusarium oxysporum (Pandy

et al. 1982). Cardiotoxic activity of seeds was shown in rabbits (O'Hara and Pierce 1974), and toxicity was demonstrated in dogs with an oral does of dried seed (Moussu 1925). Various other toxic activities have been shown from the seeds. Caution is, therefore, suggested when using the plant and further biomedical evaluation of its potential hazards would seem to be indicated.



The Black Orchid



Belize is known for having one of the world's richest habitats of flora. No fewer than 4,000 different species of native flowering plants are found within its borders, along with about 700 species of trees and several hundred species of other plants. Scientists are only now beginning to carry out an exhaustive inventory of

Belize's plants. The task is daunting: over 70 percent of the country is under some kind of forest cover, and almost half of Belize's primary forest is still standing. But, one particular flower, the Black orchid, (*Encyclia Cochleatum*), is popular for being the National flower of Belize.

This orchid grows on trees in damp areas, and flowers nearly all year round. Its clustered bulblike stems vary in size up to six inches long and carry two or three leaves. The black orchid flower has greenish-yellow petals and sepals with purple blotches near the base.




The "lip" (one petal of special construction, which is the flower's showiest) is shaped like a valve of a clam shell and is deep purple-brown, almost black, with conspicuous radiating purple veins.

Black Orchid flowers are borne on stalks called pedicels, as are other flowers. During the growth and development of the flower, however, the pedicel ro-

tates in a 180-degree angle, so that the mature orchid flower is borne upside down. Of the flower's three sepals (outer floral whorls) and three petals (inner floral whorls), all the sepals and the two lateral petals are usually similar to one another in color and shape. The remaining petal, always distinct from them, is called the labellum, or lip; it is usually larger and different in color and shape, often being lobed or cupped. With its uniqueness and quaint appearance, the Black Orchid is certainly the perfect national flower for the country of Belize.

complished in a series of flights lasting from several hours to several days. Between flights, birds make pit stops for resting and "re-fueling" which last anywhere from a day to a few weeks.

Average daily migration distances understate the amazing capabilities of migratory birds- capabilities that are put to the test when birds are faced with crossing large bodies of water. For instance, when traveling to South America in the fall, Blackpoll Warblers depart from New England and the southern coast of Canada on a non-stop flight which takes a minimum of 72 hours. That's 2,000 miles (3,200 km) in three days, or an average of 660 miles per day (1,000 km/day). This degree of exertion is equivalent to a human running 4-minute miles (15 mi/ hr; 24 km/hr) for 80 consecutive hours.

Long distance migrants have an internal clock that controls the onset of migration and the pre-migration preparations. Environmental factors set this clock and keep it fine-tuned. It is thought that certain changes in a bird's environment stimulate the production of hormones, which in turn lead to changes in the behavior and physiology of the bird, preparing them for migration. Southbound migration timing may be fine-tuned by changes in day length. The environmental factors operating on the wintering grounds, where day length is relatively constant, are more subtle and

less well understood.

How do they know where to go? The answer to this question is different for different types of birds, and for birds that migrate short distances (such as within the United States) rather than longer distances. For most waterfowl species and many short distance migrants, young birds learn migration routes and breeding and wintering locations from older, more experienced birds, which are most often family members. For most long distance migrants, birds are born genetically programmed to fly in a certain direction

for a certain amount of time. The first migration is completely under genetic control. As birds gain experience, they incorporate learned information. For instance, if they find a particular breeding or wintering location that is good, they may return to this location in the future by relying on learned information.

Although the intricacies of how birds navigate remain a mystery, this much seems to hold true: all migratory birds use a variety of cues, and different species seem to rely on some cues more than others. This can vary according to

the immediate circumstances, for example, if it is a cloudy night and the stars are obscured, a nocturnal migrant many rely more on other sources of information. Other cues used by migratory birds include: the earth's magnetic fields, location of the setting sun (and the pattern of polarized light created), topographic features of the land-scape (coastlines, rivers, mountain ranges, for example), and prevailing wind patterns (wind patterns are seasonal; during migration the wind tends to blow in roughly the appropriate direction for migration).

Buried Treasures Marked by Fire



His father and his grandfather had told him that, after marking the spot with a cross, he could not dig for nine days. They also told him that if anyone spoke to him while he was digging, he should just listen but not answer. So he didn't return until nine days had passed. When he did return, he went at night, as he began to dig, he heard a voice that told him, "I'm letting you have his money because it has been so long since I left it here. Light a candle for me." That's all the voice said.

He remembered the instructions of his father and grandfather and did not answer. He found a clay pot full of Mexican coins, the kind that circulated around here before they had the currency of British Honduras. There was no gold, just silver coins with a big sun on one side. The pot had six hundred pesos in it.

"So when you see fire coming out of the ground," my grandpa told me, "mark the spot. Come back nine days later and dig. If a voice speaks to you, don't answer. If you don't follow these rules, something terrible could happen to you and you might end up dead."

Hol Chan Marine Reserve

Off the southern tip of Ambergris Caye is the Hol Chan Marine Reserve. Hol Chan is Mayan for 'little channel.' This sanctuary was officially established in 1987, and since then the return of all species of fish has been quite dramatic. Hol Chan Marine Reserve is approximately four miles south of San Pedro Ambergris Caye. It is the single most popular day trip from San Pedro, perfect for snorkeling or diving. The reserve covers approximately three square miles and is divided into four zones; Zone A (the Reef), Zone B (the Sea grass beds), **Zone C** (the Mangroves) and **Zone D** (Shark Ray Alley).

All four zones are clearly marked on the surface by buoys. Zone A through C each represents one of the major marine habitat types in Belize. Zone D was recently added as a location where nurse sharks and southern stingrays congre-

Realizing the importance of the coral reef community off Ambergris Caye, the Government of Belize established the Hol Chan Marine Reserve on May 2nd, 1987. Shark Ray Alley was officially declared Zone "D" of the Hol Chan Marine Reserve on August 31st, 1999.

Due to the protected status of the area, the fish populations have exploded, what was once a depleted fishing area has now been allowed to re-generate, providing an unparalleled diving/snorkeling experience for visitors and an important refuge for marine life along the northern section of the Belize Barrier Reef. In waters as shallow as five feet, large schools of jacks, groupers, snappers and barracuda abound. Along each side of the cut, grow healthy stands of corals and sea grass in shallow water, perfect for the beginner snorkelers. The more experienced swimmer can swim from one side of the cut to the other, experiencing shallow reef, drop offs over the steep sides of the "cut," and sea grass and sand beds in the middle of the channel.

The entire reserve focuses on a cut through the reef, which is little more than 25 yards wide and 30 feet deep. The popularity of Hol Chan Marine Reserve and Shark Ray Alley are due to the close proximity of San Pedro, the large amount of fish life found with the Hol Chan "cut" accessible by snorkelers and beginning divers, the diversity of marine life encountered throughout the 4 zones of the park and the excitement and novelty of swimming with large numbers of nurse sharks and sting rays. This area was recently made into a national park under the auspices of the Belizean Government and the New York Zoological

Society (Dr. Jacques Carter, was instrumental as representative for the NYZ). Since establishment of the sanctuary, the return of all species of fish has been quite dramatic. This break was probably was formed by erosion during the last low sea level stand (while sea level was much lower and the reef was exposed as dry land). This pass returns much of the sea water that comes across the reef as waves, back to the sea. Even when wind generated surface currents are moving inward through this break in the reef, a few inches to a few feet down there is normally a strong current toward the seaward side of the reef.



However what many do not get a chance to experience is the beauty and tranquility of kayaking through the mangroves and down the peaceful lagoon at the back of San Pedro. Paddling through the lagoon, one can enjoy the sounds of the amazing birds native only to San Pedro. Birds fly close to the kayak and welcome the new visitors to their habitat. Up above on the treetops, one can see the colorful and quiet lizards taking in their morning sunbath. And, one's ears are flooded with the sounds of the great outdoors.

Out in the calm lagoon waters, paddlers can enjoy going through the mangroves which several non-profit organizations are working tirelessly to save. Creeks within the lagoon are flanked on each side by glorious mangrove trees and twist and turn in every direction making the kayak trip a greater adventure.

Through the years, residents have learnt the importance of saving the mangroves. The only way to truly appreciate it is being in touch with nature and enjoying the life they give. Mangrove forests protect uplands from storm winds, waves, and floods. The amount of protection afforded by mangroves depends upon the width of the forest. A very narrow fringe of mangroves offers limited protection, while a wide fringe can considerably reduce wave and flood damage to landward areas by enabling overflowing water to be absorbed into the expanse of forest. Mangroves can help prevent erosion by stabilizing shorelines with their specialized root systems. Mangroves also filter water and maintain water quality and clarity.

The east side of the island is equally as beautiful and may provide just as much adventure as kayaking through the back of the island. Moving through sea grass and turquoise waters of the caye is an exceptional experience, where paddlers begin to gain an appreciation for the life on the reef. As the adventure progresses, paddlers learn how to navigate through the sea grass and seaweeds, so as to not damage or destroy any marine life or coral heads.

If one decides to go kayaking, one should choose the two person kayaks because it has a combination of stability and maneuverability of the kayak. Paddlers begin by traveling slowly, learning different paddle strokes and getting a feel of how the kayaks handle on the water. Paddlers should also remember to bring along sunscreen, a wide-brimmed hat, a long-sleeved shirt, and lots of water. Water is essential when out kayaking and should be consumed whether or not one is thirsty. It is always a great idea to bring along a mask and snorkel to enjoy the underwater world Belize is best known

The kayak experience is a great one, whether enjoyed solo or with a group of friends. In San Pedro, organizers

are working on creating some great challenging adventures for the more competitive. Even novices can try out for these competitions. Just check out the San Pedro website for updates and further information.

However, if you're just looking to relax and have some easy kayak fun, then several dive shops in San Pedro offer kayaks for rent. Ask your receptionist if the resort you're staying in offers this great adventure, and be sure to take lots of pictures with your waterproof camera. It's an experience well worth your while!


